Length: Manuscripts, including endnotes, must not exceed 14,000 words.

Abstracts: All articles submissions must be accompanied by an abstract no longer than 500 words.

Formatting: All text, including quotations and endnotes, should be prepared in double-spaced typescript according to The Chicago Manual of Style (University of Chicago Press). Because submissions are evaluated anonymously, the author's name should appear only on the title page. Please provide your full address, including e-mail, in all correspondence.
